FRIGID NERVES. It seems to be natural to some people to buy on credit, and to get into debt without meaning so long as they can avoid paying ready cash. Give one of this sort a chance to buy on credit, and the questions of payment are matters that he cares but little about. But what a crop of trouble springs up from the seed of debt! How many gray hairs it brings, and how often it shortens life, sometimes leading men to commit suicide or murder. And yet, how easy it is to keep clear of this terrible monster.
