In the summer they dig holes in the ground for coolness, or lie in the water to escape the mosquitoes, which in these regions, are not less troublesome than one of Pharaoh's plagues. In winter they burrow in the snow, and lie curled up, with their noses covered by their bushy tails. The preparation of these animals for a journey, is carefully to be attended to. For a fortnight at least, they should be put on a small allowance of hard food to convert their superfluous fat into firm flesh. They are also to be driven from ten to twenty miles daily; after which, Von Wrangel says, they have been known to travel a hundred miles a day, without being injured by it. "We drove ours," he says, "sometimes at the rate of one hundred wersts (sixty-six miles) a day. Their usual food is fresh fish, thawed, and cut in pieces, and ten frozen herrings are said to be a proper allowance for each dog. A team consists commonly of twelve dogs, and it is of importance that they should be accustomed to draw together. The foremost sledge has usually an additional dog, which has been trained as a leader. On the sagacity and docility of this leader, depends the quick and steady going of the team, as well as the safety of the traveller."

Russian Women.—The opening article of the November Scribner is a description of northern Russia, by Edna Dean Proctor. We make a brief extract:

Within doors the peasant women are quite as basy as the men without; indeed they often share in the work of the fields. They pull and dress the flax. They spin and weave and bleach the linen. They bake and brew and put up preserves and cordials of the wild fruit, or of the raspberries and black currants, that, with a little care, will grow in almost every garden. They make coarse woollen cloth and felt for rugs, and winter boots and mittens. They knit stockings. They fashion the sheepskins in shoubas. They hemstitch the ends of towels and tablecloths, and work them with flaxthread in various patterns, and finish them with knotted fringe or with lace of their own make-patient drudges-often the real saints of the calendar-but whose recognition and reward are not of this world. Occasionally one is seen with an exquisitely fair and lovely face, but as a rule they have far less beauty than the men, and their poor, rough attire when abroadshapeless boots, scanty skirts, jackets of sheepskin or wadded cloth, and hoodlike handkerchiefs-would obscure the charms of Venus herself.


