Mr. Raymond died three years and Mr. Bennett barely six months ago. These three men were exceedingly unlike each other, yet each of them possessed extraordinary professional talents.

Mr. Raymond surpassed both Mr. Bennett and Mr. Greeley in the versatility of his accomplishments, and in facility and smoothness as a writer. But he was less a journalist than either of the other two. Nature had rather intended him for a lawyer, and success as legislative debator and presiding officer had directed his ambition towards that kind of life.

Mr. Bennett was exclusively a newspaper man.
