The Principles and Practice of

Common School Education.

BY JAMES CURRIE, A.M.,

Principal of the Church of Scotland Training School, Edinburgh; author of "The Principles and Practice of Early and Infant School Education," &c.

THE subscriber, being desirous of placing in the hands of the Teachers of the Dominion the best work on Practical Education, requested the opinion of the Chief Superintendent of Education for this Province on the subject, who has kindly responded in the following letter, recommending Professor Currie's valuable book. As the letter contains some judicious hints, which may be useful to Teachers, we print it entire.

Education Office, Province of New Brunswick, Fredericton, February 2nd, 1873.

Messrs. J. & A. McMillan.

Sir:—In answer to your enquiry I may say—that it does not appear to me that the matter of Professional Education among our Teachers is not always judiciously studied, and the compilation of numerous treatises before the public. Some of them are good works, and some of them are not. Most of those published on this side of the water are chiefly, though not exclusively, compilations of European books, and the compilation is not always judicious. I know of no Educational Works in the English language at all comparable to Currie's. They are carefully and thoughtfully written. Principles are clearly defined, and Practice receives, in consequence, a most intelligent and conscientious handling. The "Common School Education" is a sequel to the author's Treatise on "Early and Infant Education." These books, if carefully studied, would be of much service to intelligent Teachers of fair culture, and would doubtless find a place in their private libraries if brought under their notice. It is true that in New Brunswick we neither have nor desire to have out and out Infant Schools any more than we do systems of School "Organization" which obtain in Great Britain. But what is said in these subjects in Currie's books rather increases than lessens their value for the thoughtful reader in this country. With reference to the subscription to all the volumes, I am in agreement, they form of themselves a library of Educational Principles and methods more trustworthy than a multitude of kindred works.
