Ripon, who has just relinquished the Grand Mastership of the Masonic Order in England, and has joined the Roman Catholic church,

is the most important convert that church has gained for several years. He is a man nearly fifty years of age, and has held important military offices. Under both Lord Palmer-ston and Lord Russell he held a secretaryship in the Cabinet, and was Lord President of the Council under Mr. Gladstone until last September. His title of Marquis he gained by his services as Chairman of the Joint Commission that formed the Treaty of Washington. In religion he was a Churchman. His recent step is therefore an event of much importance politically, eclesiastically and so-cially.
