Our trans-atlantic cousins are supposed to have rather an undue regard for their own interests, and this will cause them to hesitate before declaring war against the nation to which they export about one-half of their produce. We take three quarters of their manufactured leather, about one-third of their tobacco and a large quantity of min-eral oils, both crude and refined. But it is chiefly as a purchaser of America's grain stores that England excells all other countries. Of the total wheat exports from the United States, ninety-six and a half per cent. are bought by us and our colonies; of Indian corn ninety-six per cent. In raw cotton also we are their best customer, importing about three-quarters of the total produce, at a cost of over thirty millions sterling.
