

who landed at Salsburgh in a boat, reports that the steamer struck a sand bank in the North Sea. One boat left the ship before that one could be rescued, and the other was lost. The date of that boat is unknown. Angus believes she is totally lost, with all passengers and crew. They numbered 100. Latest accounts from Salsburgh Colliery, indicate that the number of lives lost is 100. The explosion was caused by careless handling of dynamite in a coal mine near Salsburgh in North Wales. Twelve persons were killed, and ten injured. The explosion has caused a panic in the district. The Salsburgh Colliery has been closed, and the district is in a state of mourning. It is considered probable that the Salsburgh Colliery will propose an International Congress on the Salsburgh Canal question, and if her demand is refused will claim freedom of action in the East. Grand Duke Nicholas, brother of the Czar, who stole his mother's diamonds, has been sent to the Caucasus for debt and a disorderly life.

New York, Dec. 7.—No debt to the whereabouts of the Steamer had been obtained up to a late hour last night.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The Cuban prison of the President's message telegraphed to Spain yesterday caused great excitement in Madrid. The soldier in Northern Spain are free to death. There is a financial panic in Buenos Aires. The President has formerly summoned the Archbishop of Cologne to resign. The Daily News report of the arrest of the steamship Deutschland says the passengers were shot when the steamer struck, and the panic which followed was terrible. It was the steamship Deutschland which rescued the survivors. When she arrived at the wreck the hull of the Deutschland was entirely under water. Two boats which were launched during the night were captured alongside, and nine persons in them were drowned. Drunkenness and other officers of the steamer, except the fourth officer, were saved. A Daily News dispatch, dated Madrid, midnight, says:—President Grant's message causes great excitement in this city. An informal meeting of the Cabinet will be held to-night. The newspapers are issuing special supplements with the message. The excitement equals that over the Virginia affair. The delay of a day in the delivery of the message excites a suspicion of duplicity. The President's New York, Dec. 8.—Gold 113 3/8 and 114 3/8. The report this morning that the steamer Argos had lost her propeller was a mistake. She is reported at Mollie unharmed.
