Telegraphic News.

London, Oct. 18.—The French schooner *Sophie* & *Jules* was wrecked at Cape Archambault, on the coast of France, and 21 persons drowned. Negotiations between the British Minister, and the Chinese Government are progressing satisfactorily. The *Paik* Gazette publishes an article, referring to the murder of Mr. Margary, and declaring the rights of foreigners to travel in the interior and requiring Chinese officials to take cognizance of the treaties.

Messrs. Grosvenor and Baker will proceed to Yunnan overland, and Mr. Wade has arrived at Shanghai. The *Times* this morning has a special telegram from Berlin in which it is stated that Russia has commanded the Polish proprietors in the Province of Wilna, Grodno, Kowno, Nisnka and Vilnius to sell their farms to Russian tenants. The Government, finding the price, thus complete the improvement of the Polish nobility.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—Japan's attack on the fleet of the United States, which struck a rock near Narabour Island and sunk Sept. 16th, only seven sailors were saved, and with the sailors were forwarded from Shanghai to Yokohama, on the 21st.

London, Oct. 18.—The Turkish have crossed the Austrian border, and now menace the village of Ergo. Troops have been sent to the frontier. The *Argo* vessel, which was sent far as King William's Land, navigating an unknown sea, and encountering a deluge of weather. Pack ice prevented a voyage further North to Ross Island. Don Carlos has been driven from the service district of Durango, Madrid, Valencia and Majorca.

New York, Oct. 18.—The *Standard* publishes a special telegram from Vienna, in which it is said that a force of 10,000 Austrians had attacked a Turkish village, but were defeated after a long and bloody battle. The *Standard* also publishes a telegram from London, in which it is stated that the British Government has decided to send a fleet of 100 ships to the Mediterranean Sea, and that the fleet will be under the command of Admiral Sir John B. S. Smith.
