LETTER FROM ENGLAND.

Dear Sir.—I have the pleasure to inform you that the Halifax mail leaves here today, and will give you the opportunity of sending you a few lines.

I arrived here all right on the 15th inst., after a somewhat pleasant voyage, delayed, however, by head winds. Our vessel, the "Sardinian," the newest of the Allan fleet, was a fine ship, and the crew, 100 hands, were manned by 108 hands and is well equipped for a voyage between eleven and twelve hundred passengers. She is a fine sailor, and I can heartily recommend her to any Captain to whom you may be contemplating a trip across the Atlantic.

Liverpool appears to have changed very little during the last few years, except in the suburbs. One feature, however, is more prominent, and that is the eye of a former visitor is the river approach, which has been recently completed, and is now a fine sight, and a vast improvement on the old landing stages. Business is still extremely dull, and every body complaining of hard times; so, the public mind is somewhat depressed, and there is a stagnation in other lines as always appears to be doing well, in Liverpool at least.
