Telegraphic News.

LONDON, May 1.—In the Commons this evening Sir Henry James asked whether the Government had any objections to place before the House the bill for the relief of the poor, and the Government payors in the House of Commons, in reply, said that they had no objection to the bill being placed before the House for the same purpose.

In a Kansas divorce suit the other day a man's nose was offered in evidence to prove his drunkard. The judge said there was but one thing to be done. The party who was not drunk at the introduction was one of his kind in a sling.

Warning up to his subject, and desirous of getting as near as possible a practical illustration of his idea, an Englishman was told down the banisters, and he landed on the sidewalk.

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
