Nearly every farmer who has made an application of plaster had made it serviceable at some time, without profitable returns of another. Not one in a hundred knows the reason for suc-

Chemistry solves the question: Plaster is a sulphate of lime. Sulphuric acid has an affinity for ammonia, and when it finds ammonia it breaks up its partnership with the lime and combines with the ammonia, forming sulphate of ammonia, and this not volatile. The lime finds a companion, when deserted by the acid, forming carbonate
