FOR THE CARLETON SENTINEL. Mr. Morton.—There are various kinds of warfare carried on in this world of ours, and as a general thing they are not of much profit, but the most profitable of all is the Disfranchisement warfare.

We are opposed to excessive salaries, high rates of interest, and exorbitant per cent. profits in trade. They greatly increase our burdens and do not bear a proper proportion to the services rendered.

We desire only self-protection, and the protection of every true interest of our land by legitimate transactions, legitimate trade and legitimate industry.

Education.—We shall advance the cause of education among ourselves and for our children, by all just means within our power, by all the means in our power.

Political Relations.—We emphatically and sincerely assert the oft-repeated truth taught in our organic law, that the Grange is not a political or party organization.

Yet the principles we teach under all our true politics, all true statesmanship, and all properly carried out, will result in the benefit of our country.

For we seek the greatest good to the greatest number. But we must always bear in mind that the right is not the same as the right and that it is not a wonder, for he distinctly states that he could not separate \$200 from the whole amount voted, when it was a separate vote.

On the contrary, it is the right of every member to do all in his power, legitimately, to influence for good the action of any political or party organization.

It is his duty to do all he can in his own party to put down bribery, corruption and trickery; and see that no one competent, capable and honest man, who will unflinchingly stand by our interests, are nominated for all positions of trust; and to have carried out the principle which should always govern a politician.

We acknowledge the broad principle, that progress towards truth is made by difference of opinion, while the fault lies in bitterness of controversy.

Conclusion.—It is the abiding principle with us to relieve any of our oppressed and suffering brotherhood by any means at our command.

Implying the continual assistance of our District Association to guide us in our work—obtain the objects we have in view—here and abroad, to be faithful and harmonious labor for all future Granges.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DOMINION GRANGES. ARTICLE I.—OFFICERS. SECTION 1.—The officers of Subordinate, Division and Dominion Granges shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Gate Keeper, Ceres, Pomona, Flora, and Lady Assistant Steward.

SECTION 2.—How Chosen.—All Granges shall be chosen annually. All elections shall be by ballot.

SECTION 3.—The Master of the Dominion Granges shall be elected by the Dominion Granges, and shall be the highest authority in the Dominion Grange, and shall have jurisdiction and shall promptly report any such to the Master of Division Grange, who, if satisfaction is not rendered by the offending party, shall refer the same to the Executive Committee of the Dominion Grange, notice of the same, together with the evidence in the case.

SECTION 4.—There shall be an Executive Committee of the Dominion Grange, consisting of five members, who shall be elected annually. SECTION 5.—The officers of the respective Granges shall be chosen as follows:—

ARTICLE II.—MEETINGS. SECTION 1.—Subordinate Granges shall meet at least once each month. All business meetings are confined to the Fourth Degree.

SECTION 2.—Division Granges shall meet at such time and place as they shall from time to time determine.

SECTION 3.—The Master of the Dominion Grange shall meet annually to year to year determine. Should the Dominion Grange adjourn without selecting the place of meeting, the Executive Committee of the Dominion Grange shall notify the Secretary of the Dominion Grange, who shall give at least thirty days notice to Secretary of each Dominion Grange, all of which shall be given in proceedings of Dominion Grange.

ARTICLE III.—LAWS. The Dominion Grange, at its annual session, shall frame, amend or repeal such laws as the good of the Order may require. All laws and regulations of Subordinate Granges must conform to this Constitution and the laws adopted by the Dominion Grange.

TOWN COUNCIL. The Council held a session on Monday evening, absent, His Worship; Councillor McLeod in the Chair.

A notice was read from the Firewards, reporting that he had organized by the appointment of B. Lynch, as Chief Fireward. Several accounts ordered paid.

The report of Committee to investigate matters connected with the late fire, at the request of Coun. McCaffery, who had not been able to read the evidence, was laid over till next meeting.

A proposition was submitted from Alex. Dunlop, offering under certain conditions to become engineer of the Steam Fire Engine. Laid over till next meeting.

Wm. Mitchell, Edward Jones and James Danlap were appointed constables. Adjourned till to-morrow at 3 P. M.

On Tuesday afternoon the Council met pursuant to adjournment. A full Board present. Minutes last meeting approved.

Coun. Bridges submitted the report of the Finance Committee, recommending that \$9,700 be assessed on the Town; this is \$400 more than last year's assessment. The report was received and assented to.

\$2,800 was ordered to be assessed for schools. Per centage of Receiver fixed at 3 per cent. on amount collected by him. Poll tax fixed at same rate as last year.

The majority and minority reports of Committee appointed to enquire into recent fire were taken up, and upon motion were further laid over till next meeting.

Coun. Bridges moved, seconded by Coun. Fields.—That Donald Munroe be appointed engineer of Steam Fire Engine, at a salary of \$100 for the year.

On motion of Coun. McCaffery, seconded by Coun. McLeod.—Resolved, That the order passed to publish the report of the Committee to investigate the cause of the recent fire, with the evidence taken, be rescinded.

On the names being called for there appeared, Wm. McCaffery, Fields, Grand, Nays—Bridges, McLeod. Adjourned.

VICTORIA COUNTY ITEMS.—The Bridge on Tobique River is progressing; the piers are all down; one span will be put on before the ice goes.

Malcolm Cameron, an old and well-known reform politician of Ontario, now a member of the Commons, has recently created some excitement by publishing a statement showing that he is largely out of pocket through the Ottawa Times, in the interest of the Government, a portion of which expenditure having been made good to him by individual members of the Cabinet, he appeals to his party to be recompensed in the balance.

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He had consulted practical engineers who told him that Munroe was in every way competent. Was willing to take the responsibility of his appointment. Of the two men mentioned, considering everything, he thought Munroe was the better man to take charge of the engine.

On motion—Resolved, That the engineer select his own fireman, and report his name to the Council.

On motion of Coun. McCaffery, seconded by Coun. McLeod.—Resolved, That the order passed to publish the report of the Committee to investigate the cause of the recent fire, with the evidence taken, be rescinded.

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LOCAL LEGISLATURE.
