THE KITCHEN PUMP .- One of the most convenient and useful articles of kitchen furniture is a good pump, with a sink, and the necessary drainage for carrying off the surplus water. Notwithstanding all that has been said and written about the hard lot of the farmer's wife, many farmers have not yet done all that they can do to relieve their arduous labours. In many cases she might be saved much time, labour, and annoyance if the appointments of the house were arranged with more reference to convenience. We often see the well which upplies a family with water placed at some distance from the house. A little computation will show how great a mistake this is. Suppose it is four rods from the kitchen door, and it is necessary to visit it on an average four times each day.
