London, May 27.—A change in the Turkish Ministry is regarded as inevitable, in consequence of the demonstration of the Softas. It is likely to embrace the Grand Vizier, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, and the Minister of War.

Berlin, May 27.—A prominent Russian Diplomat says that Russia intends to redeem her pledge as far as the aggrandizement of territory went, but should she prove victorious she would insist upon the independence of Bulgaria, Herzegovina, Roumania,, Servia and Bosnia, and guarantee these provinces their independence, no matter against what power. The terms of peace, in the event of the Russians gaining decisive victories, would perhaps include the surrender on the part of Turkey of a portion of her fleet and the consummation of a treaty placing the city of Constantinople under the joint control of all the foreign powers.
