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VICTORIA COUNTY MUNICIPALITY.
Semi-Annual Session,
Andover, July 3, 1877.
Warden in the Chair.
Committee present:
Grand Jury—Brown, McCluskey,
Andover—Porter, Manzer,
Perth—Armstrong, Lovely,
Carleton—Beveridge, Hutchinson.
Present—Day, Brown, McCluskey,
Lorne—Jenkins, McDougall.
Minutes of last meeting read and approved.
On motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by
Mr. Day, the reports of committees of last
meeting of Council taken up.
Mr. Porter, on behalf of the Building
Committee, submitted their report, accompa-
nied with plans.
ANDOVER, COMMITTEE ROOM,
July 3, 1877.
We, your Building Committee, beg leave
to submit the following report:
The Building Committee, appointed by the
Council at a meeting on the first Tuesday in April
last, appointed J. E. Porter Secretary, and
on motion, resolved to secure a plan from
architectural architect Porter, and on the most
reasonable terms, directed the Secretary
to consult several and employ the one that
would work cheapest.
Resolved, That Mr. Porter, offered to
furnish plan for \$25. We employed him, and
present plan, which we, as a committee,
would recommend the Council to adopt.

the table.
On motion, the Council went into consid-
eration of the appropriation of the By-law
money to the several Parishes. Mr. Manzer
moved, seconded by Mr. Porter,
Resolved, That the By-law money be
divided on the scale adopted for the appor-
tionment of County rates.
Mr. Lovely moved, seconded by Mr. Hut-
chinson, in amendment—
Resolved, That the By-law money be
apportioned among the different Parishes on
last year, with the same conditions.
Mr. Brown asked if it was the intention
of the Council to divide the money on the
basis of last year, and if so, by which a por-
tion of the money apportioned to Drum-
mond, Lorne and Gordon, was to be ap-
portioned to Carleton, which my experience abroad en-
ables me to furnish.
Mr. Lovely—Exactly the same conditions as
last year.
Mr. Porter said there was a mystery con-
nected with this matter. The By-law money
was not to be divided last year, but that
was not the fact, and before he could be pre-
pared to state the facts, he would have an hon-
orable explanation as to how the money was
divided. Last year he voted for an equal
division, which was carried, but through the
lobbying of some members the arrangement
was rescinded.
Mr. Lovely—It was fully understood last
year and unanimously agreed to that there
should be an equal division, first among the
Parishes, and then among the several Parishes
of Lorne and Gordon, getting the same as the
others, on condition that they would put a
certain portion of their grant on Tobique
road.
Mr. Porter—What I want to know is
what amount of money was actually expen-
ded in each of the several Parishes.
Mr. Hutchinson—The matter is fully ex-
plained in the reports.
The Warden explained that \$300.16 was
actually expended for Grand Falls, Andover
\$250.00, Carleton \$250.00, and Drum-
mond; \$351.10 for Gordon, and \$241.10
for Lorne. The difference between these
amounts and the sum apportioned being ex-
actly the same, the money was divided equally
among the Parishes, and if that was not
the whole County, especially the several
Parishes named, by the completion of the
Tobique road, which would open up the
County.
Mr. Porter held that all such divisions of
the public money should be made by the
Council.
McCluskey—The arrangement was
perfectly fair, and no long as the parishes
contributing to the Tobique road was agreed to,
it was not open to objection, and no agree-
ment was made, but the interests of all
were protected. The Warden said the money
was divided. Andover was certainly bet-
ter off under the arrangement (getting one-
sixth) than she would otherwise be.
Porter thought the arrangement that
Andover was only entitled to one-sixth of the
by-law money. But he wished to see
the money divided on a fair and honest
basis, and if that was not the case, he
right. His contention was that the gross
by-law appropriation belongs to the whole
parishes of the County; that each parish
contributes to the by-law money, and if
any road for the benefit of the whole
County required to be opened up the
County should do it. The money is not
divided on a right basis, and the money
would get one-third. It was not fair that
these parishes should get more than they
are entitled to or required, and then get
the credit for the same. The Council should
be at times impossible by law, even if the
Council should be the whole County
through this Council was dividing the
money, and by the act of the Council, its
resolutions, directed how the money should
be divided. The money of the County is
not out of the County.
Mr. McCluskey said it was very well for
Porter to complain of Andover not get-
ting her share, but he wished to know if
that was the case for the other parishes in the
County. He was not sure that the money
had been raised for the benefit of Andover
and that the money had been divided. The
parish demanded large expenditures.
Mr. Porter said that Mr. McCluskey would
bring forward the statistics it would be shown
that the money was not divided on a right
basis, and as well as any other parish. If
however, the Council thought it right and hon-
est to allow Andover only one-sixth of the
by-law money, he would not object to it.
Mr. Brown—Under the amendment An-
dover will receive considerably more money
than either Lorne, Gordon or Drummond,
and he could see no propriety in this
mode of dividing the money.
Mr. Armstrong agreed with Mr. Porter.
That they did wrong last year in an excess
for doing wrong. If money is required
for the road spoken of every parish should
have a voice in the appropriation, and after
such amount is appropriated, then upon the
basis of the money they have contributed
towards the road.
The Warden explained that while to some
extent all the parishes are interested in this
road, some were more interested than others.
Lorne and Gordon, when visiting Mon-
