The Russian loss was one killed and five wounded.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 16.—An official despatch announces that Eyoub Pasha attacked the Russians under Grand Duke Nicholas, north of Tirnova, and defeated them with a loss of twelve thousand men, and Grand Duke surrendered. Three thousand Egyptian troops sailed yesterday from Alexandria for Constantinople. Raouf Pasha telegraphs the Russians have been beaten in Tivarditzka Pass, and reported Muscovite movements exaggerated. In addition to the mass of contradictions it seems to be generally acknowledged that Nicopolis has been captured by the Russians, securing the garrison of 6,000 men and forty guns. The Turks however claim to have evacuated the place before the enomy entered. The Russian garrison of Bayazid, when relieved, were reduced to the last extremities. Five hundred of the garrison of fifteen hundred were killed and wounded. They lived on horse flesh for a long time. The Turks receiving large re-inforcements, the Russians evacuated the place, but were followed by the former, who defeated them with a loss to the Russians of 200 men. This is confirmatory of former despatches. The Turksh defeat of the Grand Duke Nicholas is doubted. The Russian Telegraphic Agency publishes a general denial of the proports of Russian atrocities. On Sunday an engagement was fought near the village of Orzazars, between a Cossack force and some detachments of Bashi Bazoukt and Circassians supported by Turkish infantry. The enemy held their ground until the arrival of the dragoons and a battery of artillery sent by Gen. Gourko. Perceiving the approach of these reinforcements, the Turks fied.
