THE TAKING OF CONSTANTINOPLE FOUR HUNDRED YEARS AGO .- For nearly four hundred and twenty-five years Constantinople has remained undisturbed in the possession of the Turks. On May 26, 1453-the city was then the capital of the Byzantine Empire-it was stormed by the Turks, the last Byzantine Emperor, Constantine XIII., losing his life in the defence. The taking of the city is thus powerfully described by Richard Knolles in his "History of the

Turks," published in 1603, and a second edition in 1610 :-A little before day the Turks approached the walls and began the assault, where shot and stones were delivered upon them from the walls as thick as hail, whereof little fell in vain, by reason of the multitude of the Turks who, pressing fast unto the walls, could not see in the dark how to defend themselves, but were without number wounded or slain, hut those were of the common and worst soldiers, of whom the Turkish King made no more reckoning than to abate the first force of the defendants. 


