nution of the formative activity of the quiring skill, secrecy and experience. Office hours organism. Now it is when the brain is 9 A. M. to 6 P. M. growing that a definite direction can be most strongly and persistently given to its structure. Thus the habits of thought come to be formed, and those nerve tracks laid down which (as the physiologist believes) constitute the mechanism of association, by the time the brain has reached its maturity; and the nutrition of the organ continues to keep up the same mechanism in accordance with the demands on its activity, so long as it is being called into use. Further, during the entire period of vigorous manhood, the brain, like the muscles, may be taken on some additional growth, either as a whole or in special parts; new tissue being developed and kept up by the nutritive process, in accordance with the modes of action to which the organ is trained. And in this manner a store of "impressions" or traces is accumulated, which may be brought within the sphere of consciousness, whenever the right suggesting strings are touched. But as the nutritive activity diminishes, the "waste' becomes more active than the renovation; and it would seem that while (to use a commercial analogy) "the old established houses" keep their ground, those later firms whose basis is less secure are the first to crumble away—the nutritive activity, which yet suffices to maintain the original structure not being capable of keeping the subsequent additions to it in working order.
