

In the course of time he recovered, but had lost his reason and was sent to the insane asylum at Staunton, where he remained for eleven years. At length Dr. Fauntleroy ob-tained permission from the asylum authori-ties and friends of the insane man to make a surgical examination of the head with the hope of finding the ball. 


