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Telegraphic News.

London, April 24.—The first Russian detachment crossed the Roumanian frontier yesterday at Bestinak. Roumaniaia having received no preliminary notice yields to superior force, and her troops will fall back to avoid a conflict. The Czar's manifesto in substance says his aim has been to give Russia peace and protect the Christians of Bosnia, Herzegovina and Bulgaria, but the Porte has remained unshaken in its formal refusal to give any guarantee for the protection of its Christian subjects, and, by its haughty indifference to all efforts through the medium of the protocol, compels Russia to proceed to more decisive acts. In closing he says: "In now invoking the blessing of God upon our valiant armies we give them the order to cross the Turkish frontier.

BERLIN, April 24.—A correspondent at Kichereff says the advance corps for the passage of the Pruth will be 25,000 strong, including cavalry.

London, April 24.—In the Lords this afternoon Derby stated that 17,000 Rusians crossed the frontier last night. Mr. Layard is stated to have informed the Porte that England had guaranteed the integrity and independence of the Ottoman Empire only under the conditions laid down by the treaties stipulating for the exercise of control by the Powers. The Porte having contested this right it has forfeited the benefits guaranteed by those treaties, and England could not intervene with arms in its behalf.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—Prince Gortschakoff's

ST. Petersburg, April 24.—Prince Gortschakoff's circular after reviewing the progress of the negotiations ending in Turkey's refusal to accept the protocol, concludes as follows: "My exalted master has resolved to undertake that which he had invited the great powers to do in common with him. His Majesty has ordered his armies to cross the His Majesty has ordered his armies to cross the frontier of Turkey. You will bring this resolution to the cognizance of the Government to which you are accredited. In fulfilling the duty which is imposed upon him by the interests of Russia, whose peaceable development is impeded by the constant trouble in the east, His Majesty is convinced that he at the same time represents the views of Europe.

(Signed) GORTSCHAKOFF."

LONDON, April 24.—In the Commons to-night the motion of Shaw for a committee to examine the grounds of the demand for the restoration of the Irish Parliament, was, after a heated debate, defeated by a vote of 417 to 67.

London, April 25.—The Czarowitch remains with the army. The appearance of the Russian troop is first class. The Turkish preparations for the defence of the Danube by gunboats and ironclads are most formidable. The Turkish troops are well armed and clothed, in good spirits and condition, although dysentery has appeared among them. The immediate effect of the Russian advance into Roumania is to protect the reilmond. them. The immediate effect of the Russian advance into Roumania is to protect the railway bridge at Bouboschia, where the first collision is expected. If the Turks succeed in destroying the bridge the Russians would have difficulty in procuring supplies. Furloughs in Austrian army have ceased. Fifty thousand Russians are said to be marching from Tartar Bunor in direction of Galatzi, as well as fifty thousand crossing the river at Kenifatchin, Lowa and Angheni. The London Press unanimously condemn the Russian manifesto. The News says the best hope of the Turkish Christians is the poor one of transference from Turkish to Russian despotism. Several French and English papers comment on the ommission of any assurances against annexation.


