Wolland Canal Enlargement

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned, and endorsed "Tender for the Wolland Canal," will be received at this office until

THURSDAY, the 6th day of JULY next, for the formation of a new line of Canal from Marlatt's Pond, at Thorold, to Allamby, including the construction of a lock, locks, culverts, culverts, and piers and abutments for swing bridges, &c.

Also, the enlargement of about two miles of the canal, from the Junction downward, together with the construction of an Aqueduct over the Chippawa River, a lock between the canal and the river at Wolland, piers and abutments for bridges, &c.

And, the enlargement of the Canal from Ranges' Bend to Port Colborne, including the construction of a guard lock, weir, and supply race, &c.

The works will be let in sections of a length suited to circumstances and the locality.
