Referring to the gallant rescue of the miners in Wales, who recently were buried in a mine, the News of the World says :

We have had brave soldiers and intrepid seamen; deeds of remarkable daring have been done, and successes achieved by that indomitable pluck which is a conspicuous feature of the national character; but those great acts and deeds were done in Heaven's ight and air, where the heroes could see and breathe; but the Welsh explorers for comrades, only supposed to be living (for the chances were that they had been overwhelmed in the flood by which they were overtaken), worked in a narrow cave not a yard high, close as an ordinary drain, in the dark, and still worked on even when their efforts seemed likely to end in despair. When the roar of the liberated air, whereby the waters had been kept back had become terrific, and the blue flame of deadly gas was flashing in the dim Davy lamps, they, with unflinching courage, persevered in their task, and the men they sought were saved. 'The dangers in battle are great, as one of Her Majesty's Ministers, Mr. Hardy, said at a public meeting a few days ago, "yet they are compensated for by the enthusiasm excited by surrounding circumstances; but in the darkness of a mine, with unknown horrors which might burst upon them at any moment, when they found men in the simple discharge of a calm, resolute recognition of their duty, working on hour after hour, and day after day, with the sole view of rescuing a few of their comrades from a painful and horrible death; when they found that at the last supreme moment, with unknown dangers before them, eight men went forward, in the same spirit that animated our soldiers on board the Birkenhead, and in the discharge of a solemn, a calm, and a resolute duty, not knowing that they would ever return, they acted nobly to discharge their duty to God

Once, within a few hours of the conclusion of their noble work, the explorers seemed knew that the entombed miners were still alive; they had heard them through the interposing wall of coal, and spoken to them and received replies; they were thus encouraged to persevere. It is a thrilling passage of the narrative wherein the momentary irresolution is described. The explorers were asked to go into the working-hole again, and the reply was "No; it is death!"
