

So far, the ingenious discovery is only being employed for the detection of criminals, but it is evident that the Police authorities will not be able to monopolize it, and that it will be turned to account by society at large under the various trying circumstances of life, and more especially in the cases of deserted wives and husbands, missing heirs, disconsolate The number of vessels, both American

and British, which are annually lost is startling. During the year 1875, 1052 American vessels suffered disaster on our shores, besides 85 foreign, giving a total of 1137. Of this number 477 collided, and 209 casualties arose directly from carelessness or ignorance, 312 were totally lost, causing an immense las of property and 888 lives. In 1873--there were reported to the British Board of trade 150 vessels not heard from after sailing or being spoken at sea. They are all upposed to have been lost, with the 2381 p-rsons on board. Besides these there were -ported to the same authority 6084 vessels s having suff red wreck or casualty, resulting in the total loss of 1411 vessels and 5817 lives. During the ten years ending June 30, 1874. there were 22,098 wrecks, collisions and other accidents to vessels on or near the


