He relates that it was agreed at a solemn council that the emigrants should be lured by a flag of truce and then slaughtered, but says he tried to keep out of the butchery and was with the teams carrying the children and the wound d when the firing began. He describes the horrible scene of the massacre, and says Bishops Smith, Highee and others robbed the dead bodies of the slain. The Indiana stripped the bodies of clothing, and the wolves devoured the flesh, leaving the bones lying exposed until afterwards buried by the military orces. He reiterates his story of his interview with Brigham Young, and charges bim with responsibility for the massacre.
