

Computing the population of the country at 24,-000,000, this rate gives 336,000 as the number of peasons with only one eye in the Republic. Consequently, while 100,000 people supply their optical deficiency with an artificial eye, 226,000 go without. In proportion to the population, the eye-maker said there are more one-eyed people in Paterson, N. J., than in any other town in that or any other country. All towns that have many foundaries and factories, and whose air is impregnated with soot and smoke, count their one-eyed inhabitants by the score; but Paterson is ahead of the rest. The eyemaker knew of the three proprietors of a single foundry there each losing an eye .-Pittsburg comes next. In this city one-eyed folks abound in the neighborhood of manufacturing establishments.
