TRADE IN CANADA .- It seems unquestionable that the Dominion of Canada has suffered severely with other countries in the recent commercial depression. The late harvest was very abundant, and that has tended to mitigate the distress which would otherwise prevail. But all sections of the country, and all branches of trade, appear to have felt the restriction of the times. In the annual report of Dun. Wyman & Co.'s Mercantile Agency, which has just appeared, there are given some rather startling statistics bearing upon this subject. In reference to business failures, for example, it is shown that in 1875 there were 1,968 failures, with liabilities \$28,848,967. In 1876 there were 1,728 failures, liabilities \$25,517,991. In 1877 the failures numbered 1,890, with liabilities \$25,510,147. It will thus appear that although the number of failures during the last year was greater than in the preceding year, yet the amount involved was less than in the two preceding years.
