London, March 5.—A correspondent at San Stefano, gives the following additional details of the treaty, derived from General Ignatief:—" The exchange of Dobrudscha for Bessarabsa is to be subject to Roumania's consent; the Prince of Bulgaria is not to be a member of any reigning European family; the amount of Bulgaria's tribute is not to be fixed for two years; Bulgaria will will have the seaport of Kavala; the Russians will embark on the Sea of Marmora, and proceed home through the Bosdhorus, but will not enter Constantinople; the Bulgarian fortresses are to be razed and no Turkish troops are to remain in the country." The political outlook is regarded as brighter in all European capitals. The talk in the lobbies and Parliament is all peaceful. The members are even discussing the prospects of a longer Easter recess than usual and earlier prorogation in Autumn.

London, March 6.—Negotiations relative to the meeting of the Congress at Berlin are proceeding. The Austrian Government intends to demand a vote of credit from the delegations, on Friday, as well as 60,000,000 florins for the use, should circumstances.
