Telegraphic News.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—A Vienna correspondent says that new complications have arisen. It is reported that Montenegro and Romania refuse to restore their Turkish prisoners until they receive their lost territory and monetary compensation respectively. Another correspondent announces that the appointment of Count von Bismarck as Austrian Ambassador at Paris is definitive. It is rumored that Austria has demanded a seat at the Cabinet meetings in Cairo to protest against Austria's interest in Egypt. A Vienna special says simultaneously with the presentation of his credentials, the Ottoman Ambassador to Vienna was ordered to declare to Andrássy that the Porte was compelled to agree to the advance of Austrian troops upon Novi Bazar.

New York, Oct. 15.—Nineteen prisoners dug through jail at Kokomo, Indiana, last night, and escaped. George T. Hathaway, the Fall River dealer, was sentenced yesterday to ten years in the State prison. He made a statement detailing the manner in which he was led to take the first trial before which he was brought, and which he was charged with having committed, and being largely responsible for his failure. There were 34 deaths from yellow fever yesterday in Memphis, and 23 in New Orleans the same day. The disease is something strongly resembling it, has appeared in Helena, Arkansas, and is seemingly quite as fatal in its effects. The number of failures in the United States for the third quarter of 1876 were 1,825, compared with 1,234 for the same quarter last year. Failures for last quarter are \$66,000, 000, as compared with \$1,000,000 for the same quarter of 1877. For the first nine months of 1877 the failures numbered 8,479, compared with 6,565 for the same period last year. Failures for first nine months of 1877 are \$1,000,000, compared with \$1,141,000,000 for the first nine months of 1877. London, Oct. 15.—A large firm of insurance brokers at Leith, with a long connection, have placed their books in the hands of a liquidator. Their liabilities are heavy. A firm of local iron brokers failed at Leith yesterday. Their liabilities are \$500,000. Messrs. Gordon, stockholders of Manchester, have failed. It is believed that their liabilities are considerable. The stock exchange business is almost at a standstill. Four involuntary decrees of failure were declared today.
