London, Nov. 20.—The steamer Isommer Pomerania from New York, 14th November, for Hamburg, arrived at Plymouth, midnight. Before leaving for Hamburg, yesterday, she collided last night about midnight during a fog, eight miles south-west of Falkestone, with a vessel reported to be the Welsh barque Noel Eilean of Carnarvan, Rotterdam, for Cardiff, in ballast. The steamship foundered in about ten minutes. The 172 passengers and crew were saved by the steamer Glengarry and landed at Dover. The vessel with which Pomerania collided is anchored off Falkestone with her bows stove and her forward compartment full of water. A tug has gone to her assistance. A tele gram says that 162 persons on the Pomerania were saved and 58 are missing, including Capt. Schwenzen. LIVERPOOL, Nov. 26.—During the fog here to-day a crowded ferryboat crossing the Mersey collid-

ed with a ship at anchor. A panic occurred on the ferryboat and several persons jumped overboard. Some accounts say six were drowned, others say Some accounts say six were drowned, others say only two or three lives wore lost.

New York, Nov. 25.—The Hamburg American steamship Company have furnished a list of the saved and lost, which is believed to be accurate, in which it is stated that 79 persons were drowned. Among the saved of the officers and crew are: Chief Officer, Chief Engineer, Purser, eight stewards, trimmer, carpenter, seven machinists, five quartermasters, three engineers, seven firemen, four cooks and forty seamen.


