WORK HINTS.—The following useful hints are copied from the American Agriculturist:— Good shelter for the Stock is absolute economy; with warmth there must be an ample supply of pure, fresh air. The time may come when we shall find coal cheaper than the extra food needed to sustain vital heat under extreme cold, and use fire heat for our animals. At present we must keep our stables as warm and dry as we can; but pure air, with severe cold and plenty of food, s preferable to warm, impure stables, with

food saved. Regular feeding, if not generous, is better than food given in excess for a few days, and then stinted, or food given plentifully, but at irregular periods. Animals do not thrive unless perfectly contented, and never permitted to get hungry. The same hours for feeding should be kept regularly throughout he whole season.

A good hay cutter will save its cost in one season. Hay or straw is not made nutritious, but it is more easily masticated when chaffed; and a saving of exertion is equiva-
