Telegraphic News. LONDON, Sept. 24.—A despatch from Puth says that although the Russian occupation cannot be otherwise than unpopular in Hungary, the news of the Austrian success gives great satisfaction to the Hungarians. The Turks have evacuated the territories of Lile and Zerkow and Sakar, which is satisfactory to the Russians. The Turks have strengthened the frontier with the line of Hupus with 2,000 regulars. They have nearly 15,000 men between Tarsus and Hupus, and reinforcements are still arriving. Vienna, Sept. 24.—A Bohemian newspaper says that the commandant of Gera, near Prague, 5,000 Italian volunteers have approached the Austrian frontier. LONDON, Sept. 24.—A Calcutta despatch to the Standard states that orders have been issued to concentrate the troops towards the frontier with a view to early operations if necessary. It is semi-officially announced that the Government of India have ordered that a move will be made towards the Ganges, which would cut the communications between Calcutta and the frontier. It is estimated that there will be plenty of time for these operations before the winter sets in. PARIS, Sept. 25.—"The Paris" says: "The difficulties between France, England and the United States, relative to the Newfoundland fisheries, have been arranged. The three cabinets are now drawing up a convention, which will obviate all future disagreement." LONDON, Sept. 25.—A Southern despatch from the Southern mouth of St. George's channel reports that three cases of gonorrhea for the last time ended to-day. Ten workmen were killed and several seriously injured. NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The unfavorable weather of the past two days has increased the mortality from yellow fever both at New York and Havana. In the former there were 56 deaths yesterday, and 63 in the latter, and there are feared that this record will be increased to more than twenty-four hours. The death rate in Mississippi has been considerably less during the last thirty-six hours from a similar cause.
