THE PROTECTIONIST MOVEMENT IN GER-MANY .- Throughout Northern Germany the ree trade agitation against the Protectionist
Tariff Bill is assuming an intensity and
strength which the Government and Parliament will find it difficult to overlook. The
municipal authorities of Thorn have announced their resolution to call a general meeting of the Municipal Delegates from the North-Eastern Provinces to protest against the adoption of a protectionist tariff. If this in-tention is carried out it will be apparent that there is not a protectionist town to be found between the Elbe River and the Russian frontier, even in Western and Southern Germany, where protectionist proclivities exist. The opinion is gaining ground that the innovation planned by the Government, in order to be endurable, should be devised with extreme caution, and limited to a comparatively small number of articles. That a slight iron duty will have to be reimposed is admitted on all hands, and that the extension of a like policy to other articles will, in most instances, enrich a few wealthy manufacturers, but injure trade and reduce exports, is a truth gradually dawning even upon the more old-fashioned and exclusive districts in Swabia and Alsace.
