This last arrangement is regarded as necessary, in order to satisfy the demands of Ontario for seats in the Cabinet. and not from any doubt as to Mr. Costigan's standing in his own County, Victoria, which would, without doubt, send him back by acclamation.

The St. John Globe says :-Reports respecting the entrance of M Costigan into the Cabinet have been current for some time, and it is not at all improbable that the death of Judge McKeaguey may open the way for this. If Mr. O'Connor, now President of the Council, is made a Judge in Manitoba, in place of the late Judge, his position might easily be given to Mr. Costigan, who would readily be accepted by the Irish Conservative Catholics as their representative in the Cabinet.
