



Agriculture.

Moisture in the Soil.—A great deal is said about the fertilizing matter being carried down below the roots of the plants by water-the leaching of soils. No doubt some fertilizing matter is sometimes carried below the reach of the roots, but this seldom. Two or three months in the year the ground is frozen, so that this fertilizing matter cannot descend; then another two or three months the water which falls upon the surface does not penetrate to a depth below the roots of plants; so that we may safely say that six months in the year there is no possibility of fertilizing matter being carried below the

oots of plants. We rarely, if ever, hear of fertilizing matter, or, in other words, the minerals required for the growth of plants, being brought up from below the roots to where they may be available for plant foot. Such is, however, the case.
