Mr. R. A. Proctor has been expressing his views upon the predicted planetary troubles Of course, he styles the gloomy forebodings preposterous. In so far, he says, as such predictions (save the mark) are based on the idea that the planets influence the sun's photosphere, I may say so much as this, that in-stead of the giant planets Jupiter, Saturn, science who maintain this theory, Venus those planets, and our earth is more powerful Gravel, Kidney Disease, Liver Com than the three outermost of the giant planets.
To see this it is only necessary to remember that the tide-raising power of a planet or other orb (that being the nature of the influence assumed according to this theory) does not diminish as the square of the distance increases. Thus, putting Saturn's distance at only 9 instead of 9½ (that of the earth as unity), and the mass of Saturn at 90 times the earth's. Saturn's influence would

be to the earth's as 90 to the cubic of 9, that is as 90 to 729, or less than one-eighth of the earth's. Jupiter's would exceed the earth's (roughly) as 300 exceeds the cube of 5, or as 12 exceeds 5; but would be far less than that of Venus. Then, again, the simple conjunctions and oppositions of the most powerful planets would be far more effective than the perihelion passage of all the planets. Since we survive the conjunctions of the earth and Venus we are not likely to perish even though the giant planets should all pass their perihelia at about the same time, which, how-ever, never has happened within historic times and certainly will not happen for many cen-CUT IN TWAIN BY A RED-HOT ROD .- A

terrible accident, resulting in the death of a boy named Jones, occurred at Johnstown, Penn., on Saturday last. Just before quitting time in the morning at the Reed mill, one of the long red-hot rods whose end he had just inserted in this part of the rolls became twisted as it was guided along the iron door behind him by a boy named Jonh Bingham. The rolls were running at the rate of 450 revolutions per minute, and the twist caused the wire to curvet through the air, one of the loops falling over young Jones' body just below the ribs, and drawing him down on his knees with his back against the down on his knees with his beck against the rolls, through which the wire sped with a lightning-like raptility, John Devine, a fellow workman, was standing within a few feet of the victim, but was powerless to render any assistance. John Rowley seized an axe, and with one blow severed the wire, but not before it had cut and burned its way through the body of the victim. The left arm was severed between the elbow and the wrist, and a portion of the backbone was all that held the mutilated body together. His bowels were cut into small pieces and fell out in a mass on the floor. Death is supposed to have resulted almost instantaneously. There was a slight quivering of the muscles half aminute afterwards, but that was all. The annual statement has been issued by the United States Bureau of Statistics showing the value of domestic and foreign merchandise exported from, and the value of foreign merchandise imported into, the United States during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879. It is a remarkably interesting document, furnishing undoubted evidence of the extent and growth of trade in the country. From this report it appears that the value of From this report it appears that the value of domestic products exported during the year was \$698,334,951, an increase of \$17,625,683 over the exports for the preceding year. The exports of foreign merchandise during the last fiscal year amounted to \$12,093,792, a decrease of about \$2,000,000, as compared with the preceding year. The imports for the year were valued at \$437,051,532, an increase of \$8,740,609, as compared with the year. ending June 30th, 1878. The total value of domestic and foreign merchandise exported during the year was \$710,428,743, which exceeds the value of merchandise imported by \$264,636,602.—S. A. Journal.




