

CAUTION .- Fattening animals may be fed too much. They may even eat too much .-

This is not the rank beresy that the words seem to imply. I recognize in full the importance, and even necessity, of maintaining a continuous and vigorous growth, and to this an abundance of good nutritious food is necessary. But an abundance is always something less than too much. Whatever is fed above what can be eaten, or whatever is eaten more than can be digested, is either wasted or worse than wasted. Even so voracious a feeder as the hog may be cloyed by an excess of badly prepared and unsuitable ood. The practice of throwing ears of whole corn to be eaten from the muddy ground is wasteful. Much of the grain is lost, and a worse waste is that the bog will refuse to eat before it has disposed of nearly as much as it should. The more a fattening animal will digest and assimilate the better the chance for profit. But skilful feeding requires care and good judgment. If it only needed an indiscriminate placing of food before the animal, it would be no knack at all. To get the best results from feeding, as great a variety of food should be used as can from children effected with it. The post mor- be had.
