ONLY FORTY-NINE YEARS AGO. - UPEN-ING OF THE FIRST PASSENGER RAILROAD IN THE WORLD.-Forty-nine years ago-that is September 15, 1830-the first passenger railroad in England, the Liverpool & Manchester Railway, was opened with great ceremony. A year before a prize of £500 had been of fered for the best locomotive engine, which Green had been won by Robert Stephenson's Rocket, upon which were subsequently modeled the old grasshopper engines of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, their appearance being suggestive of their name. Eight locomotive engines had been completed and placed upon the line, and all had been tested with entire passenger carriages, each containing twenty CLOVER and TIMOTHY SEED. persons.
