



possible time, where there is no mill to grind them, employ sulphuric acid (vitriol oil) .-The usual rule is to mix with the crushed bones from one-fourth to one-half their weight of sulphuric acid. When quick action is desired the last mentioned amount should be employed. The acid may be applied as follows: Place a layer of bones eight or ten inches deep in the bottom of a barrel or tub (a petroleum barrel serves the purpose well), and wet them thoroughly with water; then pour acid cautiously upon them from a pitcher or other convenient vessel, stirring and mixing the mass with a wooden shovel; follow with another layer, repeating the process until the tub or barrel is full; allow ii to stand ten or twelve hours; shovel out into a heap and mix with ground plaster, wood ashes, or similar material.
