A DISHONORED CITY.—The Mail says: "Montreal has dishonored herself and disgraced the Province of which she is the capital. In the first burst of sympathy for the unfortunate sufferers by the St. John (N.B.) fire, acting apparently on the principle that he who gives quickly gives twice, she voted \$10,000 to be sent to their relief. No provision, however, was ever made for remitting the money, and time passed and it was not sent. Several times applications were made from St. John for the amount and it was promised. But still it did not go, and now the wealthiest city of the Dominion proposes to repudiate her charity. We have no desire to play the Pharisee, but cannot help contrasting Montreal's meanness in this matter with the readiness with which Toronto contributed twice ten thousand dollars."

The amount of water passing over Niagara Falls has been estimated at 100,000,000 gallons per hour, and its perpendicular descent may be taken at 150 feet, without considering the rapids, which represent a further fall of 150 feet. The force represented by the principal fall alone amounts to 18,000,000 horse-power, an amount which if it had to be produced by steam would necessitate an expenditure of not less than \$20,000,000 of coal per annum, taking the consumption of coal at four pounds per horse power per hour. In other words, all the coal mined throughout the world would barely suffice to produce the amount of power that annually runs to waste at this wonderful fall.

SWEDEN FOR THE ARISTOCRACY.—The report of the Inman Line has been up to New Sweden, and is arranged to bring out about 300 immigrants to Carleton, at about \$10 a head. A survey of 11,000 acres of township K. is being made and opened for settlement. It will be laid out in 80 and 100 acre lots for sale, with and without a house, at \$1 to \$3 an acre, according to locality. This shows the value of the lands on the Upper St. Lawrence. How great the demand for them must be. The best Aristo stock of land is in New Brunswick, though most of it is in the hands of the New Brunswick Railway Company.—Telegraph.

A terrible riot occurred at McIntosh, Liberty County, Georgia, on Monday, between a party of negro excursionists from Bryan County and those belonging there. It began in a fight between two negroes, when John Randall, captain of a negro militia company from Bryan Co. (a part of the excursionists) ordered his men to charge, while they did, by beating everybody who would resist, the captain himself killing one man by running him through with his sword. There was intense excitement at this outrage. The Liberty County negroes rallied and drove the military company into the cars and opened fire on them, killing four and wounding many more, only stopping shooting when they were got out of the way, which they tried to prevent by tearing up the rails. All the parties were negroes.
