A LARGE and influential meeting was held in St. John on Tuesday, called by the Mayor, for the purpose of taking measures for raising funds to send to famine stricken Ireland. Over one thousand dollars was subscribed to the Relief fund at the meeting, and a committee was appointed to consider the best mode of administering relief, and to co-operate in raising funds and receiving produce from different parts of the Province, should the same be offered.

Some of the speakers at the meeting dwelt largely upon the fact that Ireland's present necessity would force the people to use even the potatoes required for seed, or at least the best quality of such, and this would tend to perpetuate the failure of the crop. It was suggested that 10,000 bushels of seed potatoes might be shipped to Ireland from this Province, in which contribution the different Counties might unite.
