ITEMS OF FOREIGN NEWS.

LONDON, JAN. 28.—A most remarkable (and, so far as the Hebrew race is concerned) in connection with Palestine, is now the subject of conversation, and is connected with the fulfilment of the prophecy as laid down in the Holy Writ. It is to the effect—of the Jews of the Holy Land to come to the more wealthy Jews in Europe in consideration of a large sum of money.

A terrible story comes from London, N.W. Hampshire, of the murder of Mrs. Dillingham by her husband, who was charged with the execution of a woman. The case is being tried at Exeter, and shows that victim was also ravished. She was shot and choked. The report here then attempted to kill her, but he was not fatal. There is great excitement. The village is in curfew.

DUBLIN, FEB. 8.—On Friday night the burglar entered a bank, seized the president, E.C. Kunkin, who slept in building, and of robbing him, and took him to his room. He was taken in a shocking manner to compel him to give up the combination, they departed taking \$3,200 which had not been touched up to date. The burglar was on the safe, and Kunkin was unable to give up the combination. There is great excitement, but no clue to perpetrators.

LONDON, FEB. 9.—A Constantinople dispatch reports that during a fire a barracks, three stories high, near that city, suddenly exploded, 200 soldiers were killed and 300 wounded.

DUBLIN, FEB. 9.—The Theatre Royal was completely destroyed by fire. Several persons were hurt, and the damage was considerable. The police inspector and one working man were injured. The military are keeping order and the riotous mob has been dispersed. There was a performance of a pantomime in the theatre this afternoon at the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough's request. The theatre was first occupied by the ignition of curtains in their box-chairs.

FIVE lives have been lost in fire in the Theatre Royal. The loss by destruction of theatre and contents is £200,000.

DUBLIN, FEB. 9.—Fire at theatre—Several lives have been lost. It is feared that the manager of the theatre, the property man and four assistants have perished in the flames.

THE COTTON FACTORY AT ST. STEPHEN.—An cotton spinning was held in the office of the St. Croix Courier, St. Stephen, on Saturday evening, at which a number of persons were present. The factory is producing a cotton mill at that place. The Courier says that Mr. Neill, who has been deputed to visit the West for information, returned with \$20 for the cost of such mills was from \$20 to \$25 per spindle, which included mill, machinery, and everything required to start a mill. A cotton mill in Massachusetts was that a mill started at St. Stephen should embrace 10,000 spindles, and it ought not to be less than 15,000. The management of a 20,000 spindle mill costs no more than one of a capacity of 10,000 spindles. The former would require about half the capital of the latter. Every, the English is 15 per cent. cheaper than American, but it costs more to get the former up. A mill of 20,000 spindles is the largest in Canada runs over 18,000 spindles. In addition to the invested capital there would be a small amount of cash required to carry on the business. Mr. Neill said he had talked with men who, if they could get the works, were willing to invest in stock, and would receive by step would be to get stock subscribed and company organized. Several other gentlemen spoke very anxiously to see how the project would be carried out. They were appointed a committee to further consider the subject, to prepare a prospectus and to take steps for an Act of Incorporation. The committee consists of Messrs. C.H. Eaton, C.F. Todd, A.E.
