The quantity of spirits taken for consump tion during the past h cal year was greater by 636,384 gallons, or 214 per cent., than the quantity taken in 1878, and greater by 473, 597 gailons, or nearly 15 per cent., than the average quantity taken during the four preceding years. The increase occurred chiefly during the month of February, in anticipation of an increase in the excise duty. The quantity of spirits held in bond at the commencement of the past fiscal year was 1,626, 512 proof gailons, and at the end of the year the quantity was 1,267,976 proof gailons, b-ing a decrease of 360,535 proof gallons. This decrease was due to the large quantity ex-warehoused for consumption in Fooruary. The quantity of spirits exported in bond in 1878 9 was 134,217 proof gallons, a dicrease of 30,143 gailons, as compared with the ex-

ports the previous year. The quantity of malt manufactured during the year was greater than the average made during the preceding four years by 1,195.990 lbs., but less than the quantity made in 1877 8 by 1,938,033 ibs., while the quantity entered for consamp ion in 1878 9 was greater by 1,-250,460 than the quantity taken for consump tion during the preceding four years by 1, Messrs. T. Graham & Son. 985,630 lbs. The quantity of malt exported during the fiscal year was less than in the preceding year by 615 391 lbs., but greater than the average experts of the preceding four years by 6,853,207 lbs. The quantity of wholesale and retail. 


