They ase annually 50,000,000 bushels of grain and 10,000,000 of fruit, besides other materals. This makes not far from two bushel to each inhabitant, and furnishes bushel to each inhabitant, and furnishes 87,000000 gallens of pure alcohol—enough to givetwo and one-half gallons to each individud. This comes to the consumers in 100,000,000 of distilled spirits, 400,000,000 of beer, and 20,000,000 gallons of wine, besides slops to the amount of over 400,000,-

5. About 4,000,000, or one half the entire male adult population, drink—2,000,000 of these drink only occasionally, 1,500,000 are moderate drinkers, and 500,000 hard drinkwomen drink more or less—probably an under-estimate, if we include those who make




