FRATERNAL VISIT.—On Friday evening, the 23rd ult., a number of brethren from St. John's, among whom were Bro. Calvin Powers, C. S. J. T., and D. Churchill, P. G. W. Sec., paid a fraternal visit to Scarlet Banner Lodge, of Pisanois, St. John Co., for the purpose of exemplifying the written work, and spending a pleasant evening. It is needless to say that the time passed pleasantly and much good was effected.

ENCOURAGEMENT.—The reports which reach us concerning the welfare of our Order in the City of St. John, are much more encouraging than they were a few months ago.

OFFICIAL.—True Reform Lodge was highly honored on Tuesday evening last by having the presence of Bro. W. B. Jones, G. W. C. Conn., who, assisted by Bro. A. W. D. Knapp, G. W. Sec., installed the officers of said Lodge for the ensuing quarter.

CHANGE OF HALL.—The members of No. 9 Surrender Lodge, Pettois, Westmorland Co., have removed their place of meeting to a building belonging to J. Lewis, Esq., the Hall in which they formerly met having been taken for a school room. The reports from this Lodge are very encouraging. They expect to do a good work the coming winter.

We cannot, perhaps, better use this space than in giving, some passages from the speeches of representative business men in St. John, at a meeting called there to consider the advisability of at once taking steps to have an election on the "Temperance Act" immediately held. The meeting was called by circular and was largely attended. Dr. Botsford was chairman.

Mr. Andie Cushing moved the following: Resolved, That believing the adoption of the Canada Temperance Act, and its enforcement in the city and county of St. John would be highly beneficial to the citizens, we do hereby recommend that steps be immediately taken to accomplish this object.

Mr. J. Travis seconded and spoke to the resolution. He referred to the unsuccessful attempts to prove the law ultra vires.

He held that the power which the Dominion Government is the dominant power and that the Act is good, and from this point of view the Act is expedient, and further, from the experience of this Province it is expedient. He spoke of the result of the Act in other countries, and said he had found out that the drinking done in Fredericton is done in holes and corners and out of the way places. In closing, Mr. Travis asserted that the Act would be carried in St. John if put to a vote, and that it was his own belief that no argument could pronounce the Act inexpedient. If passed, its benefits will be felt by generations yet unborn.

MR. ANDIE CUSHING, Moral reformer, the old temperance man has felt the necessity of assistance by a law. Moral reform had become weak. He held that there is a prejudice in the community against the law, and it was thought necessary proceeding. This prejudice had grown from a long endurance of the evil.

MR. W. W. TURNBULL was called, and in a few words he stated that he was in favor of the Act.

MR. F. W. DANIEL was called repeatedly, and that gentleman, replying, said he was in sympathy with the meeting and in favor of the movement, and in the course of his remarks said he felt that many leading men now in their graves would have been in force years ago. He could not think there was any person present who does not regard the traffic as a very great evil. Most all crime is traced to the cause of intemperance.

MR. D. D. CURRIE said he was in favor of the Act, but that he had not been long enough in the community to know much about its requirements.

MR. GEORGE ARMSTRONG was called and said he was in favor of the movement and would like to see the law tried. He referred to the moderate drinker caused by the traffic and held that many extensive and costly lawsuits arose on account of the evil.

MR. LEWIS would have the resolution laid over for some time. If the resolution is carried the contest must be won. (Hear, hear.) I just throw this out," said Mr. Lewis; "make the voters responsible and have the sentiment thoroughly canvassed first."

MR. W. W. DANIEL replied to Mr. Lewis and disavowed that gentleman's idea. The question to be ascertained is the business men of this community convinced that the law will be morally and socially a benefit?

MR. E. M'LEOD was glad to see so many business men present. He believed the Act could be carried by a large majority and if the Act was put into operation would be necessary out of a great extent the sale of intoxicants.

MR. J. A. JACK said he occupied the floor in an anomalous position and thought not a legislator and a member of any temperance organization he would vote for the Act. He never visited barrooms and though he takes an occasional nip, he did not agree with a friend who had told him he was, as a moderate drinker, one of the worst kind of imbibers. If any reform is to be carried out much must be taken and a great deal given. Men must yield to one another. Mr. Jack continued and gave a graphic sketch of what he called the "gulp and go" system of drinking. Mr. Jack's speech was quite humorous.

MR. BLANKLEY proceeded to consider whether the people are ready for the law yet. To his mind the moderate drinker is the worst impediment to the cause. Will this numerous class, he queried, vote for the Act when the time comes? The question was then called and the resolution put and carried without a dissenting voice.

MR. E. M'LEOD moved that a committee of five be appointed to take steps to bring the Act in force in the city and county of St. John. The motion was carried and, on vote, the following committee was appointed: Messrs. Andie Cushing, T. W. Daniel, W. W. Turnball, Capt. Pritchard, V. S. White, Stanley Harding, J. Travis, Dr. Botsford, A. C. A. Salter, Thos. Dale, J. Alfred Clark and J. A. Jack. This committee were given power to add to their numbers.

Mr. Cushing was then elected as chairman of the committee.

DR. BOTSFORD was then called upon for a speech, in which he held that if the will of the citizens were worked fearlessly and the law the object, the passing of the law would be accomplished. He spoke of the present law which he affirmed was most glaringly violated all the days and nights of the week.
