SHEEP RAISING .- I am surprised that farm-

ers do not keep more sheep, and also that some farmers do not keep sheep. On many farms the flocks are small, and some farmers have not a single sheep to their names. A flock of sheep should be large enough to make it profitable to keep a ram, and there are few farms on which such a flock will not pay. I have met with farmers who have only two or three sheep, or none at all, who once kept a decent flock. When asked if neep were unprofitable, the invariable reply has been that sheep paid about as well as anything else, it not better. 'and flock has somehow got run down. We cannot afford to neglect this or any other source of profit. Sheep are e sily cared for. They are the pleasantest of all our live stock to handle -They will live on steep hill-sides and other comparatively waste places. They do not require costly shelter in winter, an open shed being better for them than a close building. They require some attention at lambing time, but if the lambs come early, there is leisure to look after them.
