Notice that some correspondents of the Temperance Column have been very much exercised over the recent issue of the Temperance Column, and their views on the subject of the Temperance Column. One very sage writer says:—

Suppose the temperance or anti-temperanceists to be any where in the majority, would it be their duty to close by law the shops of the tobaccoists or butchers? If we want to change the habits of free men we must do it by argument and example.

We say no, not unless the traffic of the tobaccoists and butchers were proving destructive to minds and morals and working injury on every hand. It is all very well to talk about changing the habits of free men by argument and example, but when men are not free; when they are so thoroughly enslaved by habit or appetite as that there is no volition of will by which they can practically appreciate argument or example, then in order to reach and save them other steps must be resorted to. The very fact that any man will write such a letter as the one we have quoted from, proves how inescapable some are to the force of argument or the power of example.

But go back. It is very easy to call names, but such names as we have quoted above are not applicable, to the workers in the temperance cause. The selfishness of the work and the object—the only object that can be suggested—should demand respect for the workers, even though they may at times appear eccentric or enthusiastic rather than logical.

It cannot be said that exceptional means are taken or exceptional measures sought in this connection, for throughout the entire policy of law, human and divine, the principle of restriction and prohibition and penalty is prominent. But if it were not so, the exceptional character of the vice of intemperance, looking at it in all its phases, would justify even exceptional legislation.

The fact is that after so many years of agitation on the subject the agitation is but fairly begun, especially in the older countries where leading men, long apparently deaf and blind as regards the matter, are now having their eyes and ears opened to the terrible nature of this melody, that in its long and unbroken march through society has marked its track with the blood of the destroyed.

No man can be properly termed a fanatic who uses words and means, to counteract an evil, which are strong to correspond with the nature of that evil. The principles on which for which temperance workers are engaged are not more theories, nor are not extravagances. They are facts established, and facts of such astounding importance as that in properly depicting them there can be no superlatives of language, and in practically establishing them there can be no excess of zeal. Says one of the writers to whom we have referred, "Cultivation, intellectually and morally, with a proper sense of self-respect, is what is required." The man who penned that sentence must surely have had some acquaintance with the social history of New Brunswick. He is presumably saying something of the social history of the world, and still his statements would indicate a wonderful amount of ignorance or something worse. Does he not know that intellectual and moral cultivation, here and abroad, have proved but futile barriers against the effects of the appetite for strong drink. Does he not know that all along the ages are strewn the wrecks of the highest intellectual and moral cultivation, evidences of the destructive power of alcohol. He must know these things. It is true, it is true, it is not attainable by Act of Parliament, but it is attainable through an Act of Parliament which destroys the means of inebriety.

We have said the temperance workers are unselfish, can those who are opposing the efforts of temperance men claim the same. No! No man, not wrought on by some selfish policy, direct or indirect, would interfere to stop an influence which, morally and socially, can possibly do no harm, but which is doing, has done, constantly since at doing good. The fact is outside the pale of logic; they can use words, but those words can not embody just sentiments. For all that is against them. Well let us prefer to be called fanatics, enthusiasts and what not, while we are justified and sustained by the spirit of truth, and still labor for the good of man.

The Morphine Mania.—This fearful disease, which makes its appearance more particularly in the higher circles, is becoming continually more alarming by the frequency of its occurrence. The head physician of a large establishment in this city, who has made this disease one of his specialties, states that he has a large number of victims of morphine under his care, and among them, only too often, married couples. The disease is caused by the abuse of sublimated morphine injections, in consequence of which the functions of the whole nervous system become seriously deranged.

The effects themselves are often the cause of spreading the disease by making propaganda for the use of the drug, they know its dangerous qualities. The symptoms of morphine mania closely resemble those of drunkenness, delirium being one of them. The only remedy for the cure is total abstinence from the use of the drug, although absolute abstinence generally takes possession of the patient; it is left to himself he falls a prey to it. Chemically restlessness, horror and despair, a generally morose and gloomy disposition, a great frequency of the crime in these times is to be ascribed to the abuse of this.
