THE YEAR WITHOUT A SUMMER. - W continue to receive occasional inquiries can cerning the "Year in which there was n Summer." Some persons appear to have wrong idea of the time. It was the year 1816. It has been called the "Year withou" a Summer" for there was sharp frost in every month. There are old farmers still living in Connecticut who remember it well. It was known as the "Year without a Summer. The farmers used to refer to it as "eighteen hundred and starve to death." January was mild, as was also February, with the excep tion of a few days. The greater part of March was cold and boisterous. April opened warm. but grew colder as it advanced, ending with snow and ice, and winter cold. In May icformed half an inch thick, buds and flowerwere frozen and corn killed. Frost ice and snow were common in June. Almost every green thing was killed, and the fruit wanearly all destroyed. Snow fell to the depth of three inches in New York, Massachusetts, and ten inches in Maine. July was acccompanied with frost and ice; on the 5th ice was formed of the thickness of window glass in New York, New England and Pennsylvania, and corn was nearly all destroyed in certain sections. In August ice formed half an inch thick; a cold north-west wind prevailed nearly all summer; corn was so frozen that a great deal was cut down and used for fodder; very little ripened in New England, Embroidered Table Covers-very or even here in Connecticut and scarcely any even in the Middle States; farmers were obliged to pay \$4 and \$5 a bushel for corn of 1815 for seed for the next spring's planting The first two weeks of September were mild

The London Bankers' Magazine undertakes t answer the question, and gives an estimate of the total holdings of British money lenders: Loaned to the British Government, \$3,railways are down for \$3,600,000,000, and foreign companies for \$1,000,000,000; Indian Government and railway stocks foot up to £3,465,000,000, or \$17,325,000,000, or nearly ten times the American national debt. The average interest is said to be 41 per cent., and to aggregate \$885,000,000 annually.
