Belief in Witchcraft.—How THE
 OLD-TIME SUPERSTITION HAS BEEN HELD
 BY SOME GREAT MEN.—Ludicrous as the
 powers appear to us at the present day,
 with which witchcraft in former times
 was credited, such powers seem never to
 have been denied or disputed by the
 great minds of the past. A witch was
 as formidable as a hero, and to be held
 in the strongest loathing; yet few had
 the wisdom or the courage to contradict
 the possibility of her exercising the arts
 she pretended to. The judge, as he
 passed sentence upon the condemned
 man, trembled lest her fell gaze should
 bring upon him and his household sorrow
 or death. The yelling crowd, as it half-
 stripped her to undergo the water-ordeal,
 shuddered as it saw upon her exposed
 bosom the marks which, it was supposed,
 proved that she allowed her "familiar"
 to draw upon her life's blood. The vil-
 lagers who went miles out of their way
 to avoid her haunts never for one
 moment believed that the object of their
 awe was either a half-woman woman, the
 victim of a hideous delusion, or else the
 actress of a knavish part to serve her
 own vile ends. To all the old crone,
 with her tall hat, crutch-stick, and black
 cat nestling on her shoulders, and black
 and white dealings with the devil, and who,
 through the might of Satanic aid, could
 scatter the seeds of misery broadcast
 wherever she listed. She had sold her
 self, body and soul, to hell, and until
 she died, claimed her power to effect
 evil. It was alleged, was unlimited. The
 great man is he who rises superior to the
 prejudices of his age; but before the end
 of the seventeenth century—with the ex-
 ception of Bodin, Erasmus, Reginald
 Scott, John Wagstaff, and Dr. Webster
 —there were none who had the boldness
 or the knowledge to brand witchcraft as
 a base and palpable superstition. We
 find Lord Bacon gravely prescribing
 "herbent, h-mock, mandrake, mothe-
 shade, tobacco, yigum, and other super-
 ferous medicines" as the best ingredients
 for a witch's ointment. From the pages
 of his "History of the World" we see
 that the gifted and practical Sir Walter
 Raleigh was a firm believer in the
 childish form of superstition. The learned
 Selden, in his "Table Talk," while
 pleasantly discoursing on the subject of
 witches, shows that he also held the
 same faith. Sir Thomas Browne, the
 kindest of physicians; Sir Matthew
 Hale, one of the most acute and spotless
 of judges; Hobbes, the skeptic; "the
 eminent Dr. More, of Cambridge," and
 the patient and thoughtful Boyle, all were
 of opinion that witchcraft was an evil
 capable of solid proof, and that its dis-
 credit merited sharp and swift punish-
 ment. It was not until the dawn of the
 eighteenth century, men came to the con-
 clusion that the devices of "witches and
 witchmongers" were only so many tricks
 and fables, and utterly unworthy of
 credence. The last judicial execution
 in England for witchcraft took place in
 the year 1716, when a woman and her
 little daughter were hanged at Hunting-
 don "for selling their souls to Satan."
 Since that date, however, various cases
 have occurred of women, accused as
 being, and drowned while undergoing
 the ordeal by water at the hands of their
 intimidated yet infuriated neighbors.

PARISH OF LIVING.—Whiskey contains
 fuel oil, a deadly poison, and glucose,
 which contains a well selected assortment
 of poison, is largely used in the man-
 ufacture of beer. The golden drip sirup
 which we use is largely made from old
 leather and rags picked from the gutter.

 winging out the youth of the land. In ad-
 dition to all this a St. Louis physician has
 found that toothpicks are made of linen
 that the linen contains deadly poison
 called linoiline; that a cat inoculated
 with linoiline on the point of a needle
 died in eighteen seconds. Is it not mir-
 aculous that so many escape?
