In I861 the value of the exports of opium rose to about \$51,000,000, and so the export has gone on increasing year after year, till in 1872, the last year of which we have any returns, the export amounted to 93,364 chests, roughly valued at \$74,661,200, of which China's share may be put down at about \$66,000,000 worth. The home traffic that dwarfs this must be prodigious, indeed. Those who contend that the Chinese Goyernment can not expect to put down the use of opium have indeed some cause for their assertion. 


