DEATH OF G. H. CONNELL, Esq., M. P.—Never before, perhaps, did the residents of this Town receive a more sudden and severe shock than when, about 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, the painful news flashed over the wires from Ot tawa, conveying to his family here the mournful intelligence that Mr. Connell had died at Ottawa at 7 o'clock that evening. It was some time after the rumor of his death spread through the community before the general public could settle down to a belief in its truth. The deceased gentleman had been suffering since Saturday last from an attack of erysipelas, but telegrams to his friends here, arriving almost every hour of each day, up to Wednesday noon, announced that he was doing well and improving and that no anxiety need be felt. On this account the shock when it did come was almost as unexpected as though no intimation of his illness had been previously received.
